Researching USCIS Records

Microfilmed Alien Registration Forms, from August 1, 1940, to March 31, 1944. ¹

Microfilmed copies of 5.5 million Alien Registration Forms (Form AR-2) completed by all aliens age 14 and older, resident in or entering the United States between the dates given.

- Some arrivals date back to 1870's, 1880's

Certificate Files (C-Files), from September 27, 1906, to April 1, 1956.

INS copies of records relating to all U.S. naturalizations in Federal, state, county, or municipal courts, overseas military naturalizations, replacement of old law naturalization certificates, and the issuance of Certificates of Citizenship in derivative, repatriation, and resumption cases.

C-Files Series:

- Naturalization "C" C-Files – Duplicate Declaration, Petition, and Certificate of Naturalization, and additional related documents.
- Derivative "A" C-Files - Certificates of Citizenship documenting derivative or "acquired" citizenship subsequent to birth (i.e., through the naturalization of a parent or a spouse). These are NOT A-Files.
- "AA" Files - Certificate of Citizenship documenting derivative or "acquired" citizenship by birth outside the United States or its possessions (i.e., child of US citizen born abroad).
- "OM" Files - Naturalization files related to persons naturalized overseas while members of the Armed Forces of the United States during World War II.
- "OS" Files - Naturalization files created for members of the US Armed Forces naturalized outside the United States under the Act of June 30, 1953.
- "B" Files - Certificates of Naturalization or repatriation issued to persons who regained US citizenship, prior to January 13, 1941, either by taking the prescribed oath of renunciation and allegiance before a naturalization court in the US or before a US diplomatic or consular officer abroad, following the loss of citizenship by reason of service in the armed forces of an allied foreign country in WW I or WW II, or by voting in a foreign political election during WW II. - Not duplicated in court records.
- "D" Files – Same as "B" above, but Certificates of Naturalization or repatriation issued to persons who regained US citizenship, on or after January 13, 1941.
- "3904/-" Files - Containing applications to resume citizenship by persons who lost citizenship as described under "B" and "D" files above, but who never applied for a certificate and for whom no prior certificate file exists.
- "OL" Files - "Old Law" Naturalization Certificates issued by INS to replace naturalization certificates which were lost, destroyed, or mutilated, where the original naturalization certificate was granted under the procedure in effect prior to the Act of June 29, 1906.
- "129/-" Files - Files documenting the repatriation of women who lost US citizenship by marriage to an alien prior to 1922, and who resumed US citizenship under the Act of June 25, 1936.

Alien Files (A-files) below 8 million

- Aliens registered between August 1940 and May 1, 1951

Individual alien case files (A-files) became the official file for all immigration records created or consolidated since April 1, 1944 (any case active after April 1, 1944). A-Files opened on immigrants or naturalized citizens who arrived prior to 1940 may contain all available INS records of that immigrant (i.e., the records created prior to 1940).

Early Immigration Correspondence files (1882-1912)

Records

- Letters Received, 1882 – 1906 (NARA ID 1564919). Arranged by number, individual files of incoming correspondence, enclosures, attachments, and usually a copy of the response.
- Letters Sent, 1882 – 1912 (NARA ID 1566701). Arranged by date in bound volumes, tissue copies of outgoing Bureau of Immigration correspondence.

Finding Aids

- **Name Index, ca. 1893 - ca. 1932** (NARA ID 4709010). Actually two name indices together covering ca. 1900 to about 1911. <https://catalog.archives.gov/id/4709010>
- Registers of Letters Received Relating to Immigration Matters, 8/16/1882 - 9/13/1887 (NARA ID 1560882, M2102) and **Registers of Letters Received, 7/12/1891 - 9/11/1903** (NARA ID 1561313). Chronological logs of incoming correspondence showing information about the origin and subject of correspondence, as well as the file number and response date.
- Subject Index to Correspondence Files, ca. 1893 – 1932 (NARA ID 1561441). Very difficult arrangement and not name-searchable

- Letters Sent [from Ellis Island], 7/1/1903 - 12/31/1912 (NARA ID 5049324). Bound chronologically, copies of all correspondence sent from the New York District (Ellis Island) between the dates shown.
